The Mid-Atlantic Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (DC VOAD, DE VOAD, MD VOAD, PA VOAD, and WV VOAD), invite you to join us for our 2nd Annual Conference. The theme of this year's conference is:

Beyond Band-Aids: Dismantling Systemic Inequities that Fuel Disaster Vulnerability

As disaster response agencies, we often respond to the most vulnerable, marginalized, and under-resourced communities affected by disasters. Systemic inequalities already exist for these populations well before a disaster strikes, and they are exacerbated by the disaster. We find ourselves simultaneously "within" and "outside" of these systems. The conference will explore how we strategize, work intentionally, and become aware of our biases in responding from within these positions to bring equitable recovery for everyone.

Conference Date and Location: March 30 to noon on April 1, 2025, Cacapon Resort State Park Lodge, Berkeley Springs, West Virginia.

Getting There: Approximate distances are Baltimore – 100 miles; Washington, DC – 100 miles; Pittsburgh – 150 miles; Philadelphia – 165 miles; Charleston – 280 miles.

Cacapon Resort State Park Lodge

The newest lodge in the West Virginia State Parks system, Cacapon Resort's 120-room luxury lodge sits at the foot of Cacapon Mountain. With indoor and outdoor dining, a spa, indoor swimming pool and a view of the park's golf course, it is the perfect place for adventurers to wind down.

Positioned in the shadow of a folded mountain ridge in West

Virginia's Eastern Panhandle, Cacapon Resort State Park is a 6,000 plus-acre, year-round destination. The park is frequented by both nature lovers and adventure seekers from around the state, as well as nearby cities such as Baltimore and Washington, D.C. Cacapon Resort is also a draw for history buffs due to its proximity to the historic town of Berkeley Springs and Harpers Ferry National Historical Park.

Keynote Presenters

Cassandra R. Davis, Ph.D., is Assistant Professor in the Department of Public Policy at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Her research focuses on the environmental disruptions to schooling communities, specifically the impact of natural disasters on low-income communities of color. Dr. Davis' goal is to support educators, community leaders, and policymakers to improve mitigation strategies, preparedness, response, and recovery in areas the highest need.

Her most recent projects focus on addressing systemic racism and building trust and community between emergency management and socially marginalized populations disrupted by consecutive natural disasters.

From 2017-2020, Dr. Davis received funding from the National Science Foundation to explore the impacts of Hurricanes Florence (2018), Harvey (2017), and Matthew (2016) on schools, educators, and students.

Since 2020, Dr. Davis has received funding from the United States Department of Homeland Security to examine inequitable distributions of disaster aid to underrepresented communities.

Dr. Davis says: Overall, my work exposes the extent to which targeted groups (e.g., communities of color, low-income, etc.), who are already more susceptible to environmental disruptions, are made more vulnerable following an event. I define environmental disruptions as anything from hurricanes to viral pandemics. I intend to identify best-practices to support these groups, as well as educators, interested stakeholders, and policymakers.

My work has been supported by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, the National Science Foundation (NSF), the Natural Hazard Center - CONVERGE, the UNC-CH Provost Office, and the Carolina Disaster Fund.

Dr. Simona Goldin, Ph.D., is a Research Professor in the Department of Public Policy at the University of North Carolina.

Her work addresses issues of justice and equity, and is guided by the belief that *brilliance is equally distributed while opportunity is not*. In her community-based work she considers issues of equity and justice and practices of transformation. Much of her scholarship examines these issues in the context of US public schools. In a deeply connected branch of work she examines issues of environmental racism, learning with and from communities about what comprises a *just recovery*.



She has studied ways to transform the preparation of beginning teachers to teach in more racially just and equitable ways and has elaborated the teaching practices that bridge children's work in schools on academic content with their home and community- based experiences. Her most recent work has looked at the ways that innovations are weaponized against the very communities they are meant to support. For example, she has elaborated a frame for systemically trauma-informed teaching practice that interrupts the deficit framing of children and their communities. With colleagues, she has designed and studied innovative instructional resources and unique opportunities– namely, home visits, performance assessments, and new pedagogies of teacher education. Across each of these has been the focus on supporting novice teachers' capabilities to develop instructionally rich, respectful relationships with families.

Goldin serves on the UNC Chancellor's Commission on History, Race, and a Way Forward, where she is co-chair of the Equity in Schools Committee. She is, as well, a SLATE Teaching Fellow, which is a part of the African American Research's initiative for Student Learning to Advance Truth and Equity (SLATE) at the University of North Carolina. Goldin holds a master's degree in management and urban policy analysis from the New School University and a PhD in educational studies from the University of Michigan.
